


Again, the first psalm of each book is the most complete and definitive.

Psalm 107 tells of deliverance from four kinds of distress:

- 1) Those who wander in the wilderness (4-5)
- 2) Those who "sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, being bound in affliction and iron" (10-12)
- 3) The affliction of fools because of their transgressions and iniquities (17-18)
- 4) Terrors on the sea (23-27)



## ← This pattern is repeated four times.

We read of man's distress, his cry to God for help, his deliverance, and subsequent praise.

Each cycle ends with this:

"Oh that men would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men!"

- And gathered them out of the lands, from the east, and from the west, from the north, and from the south.


Psalm 107 begins with an introduction or prelude.







## Psalm 107:35-38

Once again, the second psalm of each book speaks of our enemies. Psalm 108 celebrates their complete destruction.

Verses 1-5 of Psalm 108 are also found in Psalm 57:7-11. Verses 6-13 are found in Psalm 60:5-12.





The second "immutable thing" is written in Psalm 2:7, and quoted two times in Hebrews (1:5 and 5:5).

Psalm 118 is the last psalm of Part One.

The Believer's Bible Commentary says, "The occasion of this magnificent chorus of praise is the Second Coming of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ."

The last time Jesus stood before his people in Jerusalem, they cried out to Pilate, "We have no king but Caesar!" (John 19:15).

Psalm 118 anticipates the *next* time Jesus will stand before his people. On the glorious day of his coronation, all Israel will worship him as their King, High Priest, and Messiah.

This psalm is a musical dialogue between the King and his people. The soloist is the King of kings. The choir is his Bride.

The following pages are based on the structure suggested in The Believer's Bible Commentary. The verses sung by the soloist (the King) are on the left, and the verses sung by the choir (his congregation ) are on the right.

Only God knows the exact way these verses should be arranged. But this will give us a hint of the joyful sound we will hear that day!





This verse does not refer to just any day. This is the day of the Lord's coronation that begins his 1,000-year reign. This is the day that the world has been waiting for since time began. For a truth, "We will rejoice and be glad in it"!
