






We continue our study of the pastoral epistles with the book of Titus.

Paul was a servant by his personal commitment, and an apostle by divine appointment.



Titus is not mentioned in Acts, but his name appears nine times in 2 Corinthians, and twice in Galatians.

Galatians 2:1-3

- ¹ Then fourteen years after I went up again to Jerusalem with Barnabas, and took Titus with *me* also.
- ² And I went up by revelation, and communicated unto them that gospel which I preach among the Gentiles, but privately to them which were of reputation, lest by any means I should run, or had run, in vain.
- ³ But neither Titus, who was with me, being a Greek, was compelled to be circumcised:

The fact that his name is mentioned along with Barnabas tells us that Paul met Titus *before* he met Timothy.

We also know that Titus was not a Jew.

Once again, the word "mercy" is in Paul's blessing.

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Paul now instructs Titus on the ordination of elders in the church.			


"The apostle spread the gospel in the cities of Crete after his release from Roman imprisonment and he left Titus there to finish organizing the churches."

1) He does nothing that dishonors God or the gospel.

In verses 7 to 9, he speaks specifically about the qualifications of a bishop, the chief overseer in a church.

1) He conducts himself as a servant in God's household.

1 Corinthians 4:1-2

- Let a man so account of us, as of the ministers of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God.
- ² Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful.

He can "encourage people with healthy instruction and refute those who speak against it" (CEB).

In the next section, Paul shows why this skill is so necessary.

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Paul warned Titus of people who would challenge the truth of the Gospel.

- ¹⁰ For there are many unruly and vain talkers and deceivers, specially they of the circumcision:

The freedom that we have in Christ is always a problem to legalists.

- ¹⁰ For there are many unruly and vain talkers and deceivers, specially they of the circumcision:

There is no right of free speech in church. People who spread lies need to be silenced.

False teachers tell people what they *want* to hear – all for the sake of taking their money.

Paul now writes about the bad reputation of the people of Crete.

- ¹² One of themselves, even a prophet of their own, said, The Cretians are alway liars, evil beasts, slow bellies.
- ¹³ This witness is true.Wherefore rebuke them sharply, that they may be sound in the faith;
- ¹⁴ Not giving heed to Jewish fables, and commandments of men, that turn from the truth.

From the word Cretian – a person from Crete – we now have the word "Cretin" – a stupid person.

- ¹² One of themselves, even a prophet of their own, said, The Cretians are alway liars, evil beasts, slow bellies.
- ¹³ This witness is true.Wherefore rebuke them sharply, that they may be sound in the faith;
- ¹⁴ Not giving heed to Jewish fables, and commandments of men, that turn from the truth.



In 1 Timothy 6:5, Paul told Timothy to "withdraw" from false teachers. Here Paul tells Titus to "rebuke them sharply."

When someone speaks lies *outside* of church, you can walk away from them. When someone speaks lies *inside* the church, influencing people who don't know better, they must be publicly rebuked.

- ¹³ This witness is true.Wherefore rebuke them sharply, that they may be sound in the faith;
- ¹⁴ Not giving heed to Jewish fables, and commandments of men, that turn from the truth.



A godly person will be grateful for the correction.

Proverbs 9:8b
