
Paul's letter to Philemon is sometimes classified with the pastoral epistles.







Even this short letter (25 verses in total) has a very intricate structure.



This letter was sent from Rome from both Paul and Timothy, who was also known to Philemon.

- Paul, a prisoner of Jesus Christ, and Timothy our brother, unto Philemon our dearly beloved, and fellowlabourer,
- And to our beloved Apphia, and Archippus our fellowsoldier, and to the church in thy house:
- ³ Grace to you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Philemon is greeted with affection and respect.

- Paul, a prisoner of Jesus Christ, and Timothy our brother, unto Philemon our dearly beloved, and fellowlabourer,
- And to our beloved Apphia, and Archippus our fellowsoldier, and to the church in thy house:
- ³ Grace to you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Two pieces of evidence indicate that Philemon was a wealthy man. First, his home was large enough to be the meeting place for the church.

- Paul, a prisoner of Jesus Christ, and Timothy our brother, unto Philemon our dearly beloved, and fellowlabourer,
- And to our beloved Apphia, and Archippus our fellowsoldier, and to the church in thy house:
- ³ Grace to you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

(Church historians agree that Christians met in private homes until the 3rd century AD.)

- Paul, a prisoner of Jesus Christ, and Timothy our brother, unto Philemon our dearly beloved, and fellowlabourer,
- And to our beloved Apphia, and Archippus our fellowsoldier, and to the church in thy house:

The second indication of Philemon's wealth was (as shall be seen), he owned slaves.

- And to our beloved Apphia, and Archippus our fellowsoldier, and to the church in thy house:

Apphia was very likely the wife of Philemon.

- Paul, a prisoner of Jesus Christ, and Timothy our brother, unto Philemon our dearly beloved, and fellowlabourer,
- And to our beloved Apphia, and Archippus our fellowsoldier, and to the church in thy house:
- ³ Grace to you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Archippus was likely the elder of the church. He is given a warning and exhortation in Paul's letter to the Colossians:

Colossians 4:17

And say to Archippus, Take heed to the ministry which thou hast received in the Lord, that thou fulfil it.

This is Paul's customary benediction.

Grace and peace are gifts from God through his Son. Truly there is no peace without grace, and no grace without peace.

4-6 Paul's prayer for Philemon

It is possible that these two men never met face-to-face, but Paul was keenly aware of Philemon's history of benevolence to the church.

- ⁴ I thank my God, making mention of thee always in my prayers,
- Hearing of thy love and faith, which thou hast toward the Lord Jesus, and toward all saints;
- That the communication of thy faith may become effectual by the acknowledging of every good thing which is in you in Christ Jesus.

4-6 Paul's prayer for Philemon

Paul prayed that word of Philemon's faith (demonstrated by his good works towards the church) would spread, so that all would see Christ's blessing upon his life, and glorify God.

Paul prayed that word of Philemon's faith (demonstrated by his good works towards the church) would spread, so that all would see Christ's blessing upon his life, and glorify God.

This is what Christ wants for us all.

Paul's joy in Philemon

This generosity of spirit had been Philemon's manner all along.

Philemon 1:7

Paul's joy in Philemon

"The bowels were regarded by the Hebrews as the seat of the tenderer affections, esp. kindness, benevolence, compassion; hence, our heart (tender mercies, affections, etc.)"

Being who he was, Paul was in a position to simply *tell* Philemon what he wanted done. But also being who he was, Paul expressed his desire as a *request*.

- Wherefore, though I might be much bold in Christ to enjoin thee that which is convenient,
- 9 Yet for love's sake I rather beseech thee, being such an one as Paul the aged, and now also a prisoner of Jesus Christ.

To "enjoin" someone is to give him an order or command.


"That which is convenient" is that which is fitting or appropriate.

- Wherefore, though I might be much bold in Christ to enjoin thee that which is convenient,

Paul was pressing Philemon to make a certain sacrifice, not out of duty to Paul (although that was clearly owed), but for the sake of Christian love.

- Wherefore, though I might be much bold in Christ to enjoin thee that which is convenient,
- 9 Yet for love's sake I rather beseech thee, being such an one as Paul the aged, and now also a prisoner of Jesus Christ.



Paul's request was for a runaway slave named Onesimus, who was still bound to Philemon.

Onesimus had fled from Colosse to Rome. There he met Paul, who led him to salvation in the name of Jesus Christ.

- I beseech thee for my son Onesimus, whom I have begotten in my bonds:
- Which in time past was to thee unprofitable, but now profitable to thee and to me:

It is fair to assume that Onesimus kept his situation a secret from Paul for some time before making his confession.

It must have come as quite a surprise to him that Paul actually knew the man he had run from.

- I beseech thee for my son Onesimus, whom I have begotten in my bonds:
- Which in time past was to thee unprofitable, but now profitable to thee and to me:

As a runaway, he had been a very unprofitable servant to Philemon. But now as a Christian brother, he was profitable to them both, for he had become a very devoted servant to Paul.

Paul was now sending Onesimus back to his master, as was the right thing to do.

But Paul wanted Philemon to know that Onesimus had become quite dear to him, and he would have much preferred for Onesimus to stay with him in Rome.

- Whom I have sent again: thou therefore receive him, that is, mine own bowels:

It is very likely that the penalty for a runaway slave was death, and this was one reason Paul was so adamant in his plea for this man.

Nevertheless Paul knew that Philemon had the final word in the matter. It was not up to him to decide Onesimus's fate.

He knew that Philemon's mercy toward Onesimus would be rewarded in heaven – but only if the act came from his heart.

2 Corinthians 9:7

Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver.

Philemon 1:14

Paul makes the bold suggestion that Onesimus' running away was an act of providence so he would return to Philemon as a brother in the Lord.



And this, Paul reminds him, made him much more valuable to them both.

Philemon 1:16b:

Now the structure starts to mirror itself.

17-18 Paul, the debtor

Paul wanted to be sure that Onesimus would be well-treated upon his return. He therefore made a personal pledge to Philemon on his behalf:

- If he hath wronged thee, or oweth thee ought, put that on mine account;

20-21 Paul's joy in Philemon

As you have refreshed others, Paul says to Philemon, so now refresh me.

Philemon 1:20

Yea, brother, let me have joy of thee in the Lord: refresh my bowels in the Lord.

20-21 Paul's joy in Philemon

Paul now frames his request in terms of both Philemon's obedience to God and Paul's confidence in him.

This is now a favor that Philemon knows he cannot refuse.

Having confidence in thy obedience I wrote unto thee, knowing that thou wilt also do more than I say.

As an added incentive, Paul let Philemon know that he expected to be soon released from prison, crediting Philemon's prayers for this happy development.

As an added incentive, Paul let Philemon know that he expected to be soon released from prison, crediting Philemon's prayers for this happy development.

He would then be able to visit him – and see for himself how Onesimus was being treated!

The last three verses of Paul's letter to Philemon contain his greeting to various members of the church.

Philemon 1:23-24

- There salute thee Epaphras, my fellowprisoner in Christ Jesus;
- ²⁴ Marcus, Aristarchus, Demas, Lucas, my fellowlabourers.

Along with Onesimus, each of these men are named in the closing verses of Colossians.

Onesimus (4:9) Epaphras (4:12) Marcus and Artistarchus (4:10) Demas and Lucas (4:14)

Philemon 1:23-24

Once again, Paul's message begins and ends with grace.

The postscript to this epistle is not included in all Bible versions.

This underscores the fact that Onesimus was indeed a helper to Paul, and that he knew what Paul had written to Philemon!
